How Shall We Use Our Time?

This past month we celebrated Martin Luther King, Jr. day as a national holiday. I have been amused how our culture often takes the title of Reverend away from Martin Luther King Jr. and refers to him simply as Dr. King. I've visited his grave in Atlanta and on that headstone it says: "Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr." There is no mention of his doctorate or any other accolade. You can't understand the life and motivation of this man unless you are willing to understand the faith that he embraced. It was the Gospel of Jesus Christ that motivated his work for justice and equality. It was his understanding of God that led to his insistence on love and nonviolent resistance. It was his faith in Christ that gave him the strength to continue his work even when all the instruments of fear and hatred where targeted toward him. He took seriously the role of pastor and he lived it out with great passion and dedication. His doctorate is fine and good, but it was his faith that made a difference!

Of course one of Pastor King's greatest gifts was his ability to communicate through his speeches and thus motivate and strengthen the civil rights movement. This year someone shared with me one of his speeches in London England that has just recently been rediscovered. I recommend it highly as not only a great history lesson on civil rights in America but as a way to move deeper into his motivations:

While listening to this speech from 1964 the following lines shouted out to me from across the decades: "And somewhere along the way it is necessary to see that human progress never rolls in on the wheels of inevitability. It comes through the tireless efforts and the persistent work of dedicated individuals who are willing to be co-workers with God. And without this hard work, time itself

becomes an ally of the primitive forces of social stagnation. And so we must help time, and we must realize that the time is always ripe to do right. This is so vital, and this is so necessary."

In a sense this is how the Christian life is lived out, we are those who have been called to "help time." We are the ones who realize that the call to discipleship is hard work that compels us to constantly reimagine, rediscover and recondition our lives to reflect the one whom we claim as Lord and Savior. The work of doing good, is just that, WORK. In fact, not only is it work, but it's hard work. It's the kind of work that if we aren't careful can leave us feeling defeated and demoralized. This is why we need times of centering and renewal times like the season of Lent.

Lent provides us a chance to not only be honest about ourselves but to reorder our lives based on the priorities and values that we say are important to us. It is a call to good works, but also a call to remember the love of God in Jesus Christ, which must be our center and grounding of who we are. So I encourage you to take some intentional time for your spiritual well-being during this season of Lent. We have a lot of work yet to do if we are going to 'help time' realize all that God intends, but we must also 'take time' to remember whose we are, and from where our strength comes.

~ Ash Wednesday Worship ~ Wednesday February 18th at 7:00 pm Why do we do that?

Ash Wednesday is the Wednesday of the seventh week before Easter and the first day of Lent. The day is named for the practice of imposing ashes, a practice which many Lutheran congregations have found to be a very meaningful part of the Ash Wednesday liturgy.

Using ashes as a sign of repentance is an ancient practice, often mentioned in the Bible (e.g., Jonah 3:5-9; Job 42:6; Jeremiah 6:26; Matthew 11:21). The early Christians adopted the use of ashes from Jewish practice as an external mark of penitence.

- Ashes symbolize several aspects of our human existence:
- Ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19).
- Ashes suggest cleansing and renewal. They were used anciently in the absence of soap. On Ash Wednesday ashes are a penitential substitute for water as a reminder of our baptism.
- Ashes remind us of the shortness of human life, for it is said as we are buried: "earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust."
- Ashes are a symbol of our need to repent, confess our sins, and return to God.

In the Ash Wednesday worship those who desire to receive the ashes come forward. Ashes are applied in the form of a small cross on the forehead of each person with the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. "But this reminder of our mortality is not meant to be 'bad news;' but to drive us into the incredible 'Good News' of God's love for us in Jesus Christ. For while we may be mortal, and while each and every one of us falls short of the glory of God; in Christ we receive the promise of being children of God and therefore with Christ heirs to eternal life. While the honest assessment of ourselves is a powerful moment, the promise of God's love us is greater still!



The 40 weekdays, from Ash Wednesday until Easter, are considered to be a season of abstinence and penitence in preparation for Easter. In observance, we are going to offer

a traditional soup supper throughout Lent.

During the season of Lent beginning February 25th through March 25th join us Wednesday nights at 6:00pm for Soup and Fellowship followed by Lenten worship at 6:45pm.

Soup will be provided by the following ministries:

n my work as a music therapist, I often organize my sessions around "themes" relating to calendar events. February is a wealth of things to celebrate: Super Bowl, Valentine's Day, President's Day, Mardi Gras.

The church will observe Ash Wednesday on Wednesday, February 18. You will more than likely NOT see Ash Wednesday decorations at Walmart or Ash Wednesday cards at the Hallmark store. However, Ash Wednesday is the start to Lent -40 days of preparation before Holy Week and Easter.

Even though Ash Wednesday has not made the list of "popular" holidays in the sense of public celebrations, I have had some memorable public experiences after our Ash Wednesday services. I remember several years ago I went to a local gas station after our service. The young lady working at the mini-mart at 8:45pm on a Wednesday night looked at the ash cross on my forehead and broke into a smile. She said, "God Bless You", as she took my payment. Another year I had to stop and get some groceries on the way home from the service. Again, people would look me in the eye and smile or say "God Bless You" as they passed me in the aisle. Was I doing anything out of my ordinary shopping "routine"? No, but this visible sign of God in my life spoke to others.

I found a statement on a website <u>www.buildfaith.org</u> that I liked. It speaks to the unity that is created by a ritual such as the imposition of ashes. It also mentions the unity created by song:

That is what Ash Wednesday does for all of us - young and old. It gives us a place to stand grounded and rooted. And a little bit of song might just help us take down our medicine more easily. You may be an adult singing in a formal service, or a child humming in a playroom – the truth is, "ashes, ashes, we all fall down." And the same loving Creator who formed us from the dust continues to hold us up in eternal love.

The word "Lent" means "Spring". Here is a "Coffee with Jesus" comic that talks about growing.



I am thankful for our place of worship and the unity I feel with my fellow worshippers and with God when I am in worship. And, I am thankful for rituals such as the imposition of ashes and music which further unify us.

Winter Camp Season Is Here!



9t's winter camp season and I could not be more excited about it! Each winter the youth ministry of Our Savior's offers a short winter camp experience to all youth and their friends. These retreats are put on by the good folks at LRCC (Lutheran Retreats, Camps, and Conferences) at El Camino Pines, a rustic camp in the Los Padres National Forest.

We offer 3 opportunities for the winter camp retreat experience each according to age:

- Kids Club (Grades 3-5) Which has already happened as of publication
- Middle School February 20-22
- High School February 6-8

With the increased number of students attending weekly youth group meetings (yes, we are growing in numbers!) I expect this winter to have wonderful camp attendance.

The following is a paraphrased version of an article by "Nancy" from the ELCA Youth Ministry Network's website detailing the reasons why camp is an important component to the whole youth group experience.

Controlled Independence

One afternoon at camp, I asked one of the kids, "Do you miss your mom?" "No!" she replied (a little too enthusiastically, I might add). "I feel like a teenager just hanging out with my friends!"

Camp is a great opportunity to learn a little independence, but still have plenty of adult supervision. Mom isn't hovering about nagging-reminding them to brush their teeth and make their bed. But it's not a free-for-all, either. Kids learn responsibility and independence by keeping their bunks tidy, keeping their clothes together, and being ready on time...all under the supervision of adult leaders.

Positive Role Models

The camp employs amazing, enthusiastic young adults who have all gone through extensive training and have a real passion for outdoor ministry and a genuine love of the Lord, the kids LOVE them too! Our returning campers get so excited when they see a counselor that they remember from their last camp experience because they have formed a wonderful relationship in a fun and caring environment.

It's Fun!

With so many activities available, it's no wonder the kids that have been to camp want to return. Favorite camp activities include theme meals, all camp games, the pool (not in winter), arts and crafts and campfires.

They Will Encounter God

Camp can play a significant role in your child's spiritual life. Your child will learn about Christ at camp. They will learn to have a quiet time at camp. They will learn to recognize God's Spirit speaking to their heart at camp. They learn to work out their faith at camp.

At some point, your child will choose to either make your faith their own or reject it entirely. You can't make that choice for them, but you can give them opportunities along the way.

A Bible-believing camp is the perfect chance for your kids to step into their own relationship with God. For a few days they are not distracted by home life, sibling squabbles, or pressure from school. It's just them and God.

We often think nothing of plunking down hundreds of dollars for soccer camp, gymnastics camp, band camp, or (fill in the blank with any other activity) camp. We will even schedule family vacations and other commitments around them, because we recognize the benefit of concentrated efforts in those areas. What would happen if we put as much effort (and financial backing) toward our children's spiritual development? What if we gave them every opportunity to stretch their spiritual muscles in a safe and loving environment like camp? Imagine what might happen when, years down the road, they look back on their camp experience and say, "I know God is real, because I met Him at camp."

What experiences have you or your kids had at church camp?



February Family Devotion:

Teaching children early on to LOVE TO PRAY is a foundation block that is easy and can be made fun! What's your favorite prayer from when you were a child? Do you ever let your children take the lead in prayer? Do your children watch you pray? Here is a fun way to introduce prayer for young children that adults can even use, that reminds us that prayer is for everyone and prayer can be as simple as using your hand...

Teaching Kids the Five Finger Prayer

Thumb (people who are close to you)

These are your close friends and family, often the first you think about when you pray. Give thanks to God and ask his protection on your parents, siblings, friends, and classmates.

Pointer (people who point the way)

These are leaders in your life, such as teachers and pastors. Offer God your thanksgiving for them and ask him to help them in their important work.

Tall Finger (people in authority)

The big people in the world need prayer too. Ask God to give wisdom to our government, military, and police.

Ring Finger (people who are weak)

This is your weakest finger. We should remember others who are sick, live in poverty, or are treated badly. Pray that Jesus would give them new strength.

Little Finger (your own needs)

God wants to hear your needs too, especially when you put others first. Pray for your own growth in mind, body, and spirit.



<u>You Name It</u>

Name Tag - /'neim,tæg/- plural name tags: a piece of paper, cloth, plastic, or metal that has a person's name written on it and that is attached to the person's clothing. Example: She handed out name tags for people to wear during the morning service to help the congregants learn each other's names.

Be mysterious. Be proud of your name. Be narcissistic. Be yourself. Be someone else. Print legibly. Scribble out of control. Large block letters. Tiny calligraphy. Use your best cursive. Your choice. You name it.

A couple of months ago we had a name tag Sunday and it went gangbusters with people pushing and crowding around the tables to get their tags, write their names, decorate them and just have fun. You know, we ended up having to put up barriers to guide people and some of us had bullhorns to control the unruly crowd. "Please don't push each other. There are plenty of name tags to go around and the Sharpies are full of ink. We have pages of stickers so we will not run out. Keep it moving and we can get all of the congregants into service on time." Were you there to experience this or did you miss it? Well, OK, so maybe a bit of an exaggeration of the real event, but I do recall that at one point we did have two people waiting to complete their name tags. They both wanted to use the orange Sharpie...

By wearing your tag, someone may learn or remember your name. Simple and fun.

Even that can get a conversation going and you may meet someone new or someone you already knew.

We will be having Name Tag Sunday again coming up soon and I look forward to seeing names that I should remember and then reinforcing the name with the face. Perhaps that will happen to you too. Maybe you will learn someone's secret wannabe name. How great is that? Simple and fun!

Typhoon Haiyan One Year Later: YOU MAKE A DIFFERENCE!




The Situation: One of the most powerful storms ever recorded crashed across the central islands of the Philippines. The

typhoon impacted approximately 13.28 million people, destroyed 1.1 million homes and has displaced more than 4 million people. One year later, we remember and pray for all who lost their lives, homes, communities and livelihoods to Super Typhoon Haiyan.

Our Response:

Lutheran Disaster Response received an outpouring of prayers and financial support. More than \$2.5 million was collected to directly respond to Typhoon Haiyan. Together, we were able to provide immediate need to people and communities affected, and we continue to walk with our brothers and sisters in the Philippines who are still working to rebuild their lives and livelihoods.

The work has been extensive and still continues. This has taken the form of shelter repair kits, making it possible for people to start to rebuild and return to their homes. Safe drinking water has been provided with water filtration units, wells constructed or repaired and an increase effort of household sanitation through latrines and hygiene kits. Cash-for-work programs were established to assist people whose livelihoods were destroyed by the typhoon. This program allowed people to participate in clean-up efforts within their communities, while earning an income to provide for their families. Food as well as non-food items were distributed to help meet short-term needs.



Priority Enrollment

Priority Enrollment ends February 12th. This is the time set aside for returning students, their siblings, church members and elementary alumni families to enroll. Given the limitations on enrollment, class size and physical space, we cannot guarantee that a space will be held for a child if they enroll after 2/12/2015.

supply food, education and advocacy for the hungry in Orange County.

The school office will be closed on Friday, February 13 and Monday, February 16 in observance of Presidents' Day








