"Behold the man." John 19.5 NKJV

He was probably shorter than we would imagine, darker in complexion, darker hair and eyes, and his appearance would have been that of a wounded, sleep deprived prisoner of the most austere conditions. Blood would have coalesced along his wounds; his face would be swollen from being struck the night before and from the beatings that he had just endured. He had been flogged so that it would have been hard for him to stand straight and the robe that they put on him would have been painfully sticking to his exposed flesh. No one knows for sure but it was probably from a nearby Jujube tree that a ring of thorns was hastily crafted and thrust on his head. So there he was a beaten, spectacle of a human being, being paraded out in front of his accusers by the most powerful man in the region, Pilate, the Roman Governor of Judea.

Gesturing to the outcome of his orders and the handiwork of his guards, he calls out to those who had brought the man to Pilate's attention, calling him a threat, an insurrectionist, and a zealot and there in the holy city of Jerusalem, Pilate proclaims: Behold the man. "Ecce homo," as Jerome will translate it in the Latin Vulgate. It has been a phrase used by poets and artists to zero in on this one moment in history. Behold the man.

Behold what a measly Roman Governor backed by imperial power can do to the prince of peace. Look at how his mouth that once so cleverly told parables and preached on behalf of the kingdom of God is now filled with broken teeth and the taste of his own blood. The local authorities may have been afraid to confront him for fear of the people, but Pilate and his associates have no qualms in breaking a man nearly in half as an example to others. He wanted to be a king; here is what Rome thinks of his claims. There he stands, to be pitied more than anything else, with his royal robe and glistening crown as the final joke. He is alone. Behold the man.

Behold what his teaching about love of neighbor and the mercy of God have gotten him. "Turn the other cheek, go the extra mile, pray for those who persecute you, judge not lest you be judged;" nothing but words that have fallen like seeds into the rocky and barren soil of the real world where power is not easily convinced that the old ways of violence and terror aren't the best solutions to the problems that plague us. And where are the crowds that cheered him on as he entered the city? And where are his followers, his disciples, his so called friends who pledged to 'die with him' if necessary? He is alone. Behold the man.

Behold the prophet Isaiah spoke of this moment some 500 years before it occurred. "He was despised and rejected by others; a man of suffering and acquainted with infirmity; and as one from whom others hide their faces he was despised and we held him of no account." (Isa. 53.3) And yet from the ancient words of the prophet their came also a promise. A strange, impossible promise: "But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed." (Isa. 53.5) He alone has done this. Behold the man.

Behold some of our women went to his tomb early on Sunday morning and the stone was rolled away and what they saw....Could it be that love does carry the day? Could it be that his kingdom has come? Could it be that his words had life? Could it be that the old prophet was right? Ecce homo, Alleluia! He is Risen, Indeed! Alleluia!

When I was growing up, our family *always* went to church. We went on Sundays. We went on holidays. There was no excuse we could make that was acceptable to miss church. It was just something we did.


I especially liked Holy Week. The contrasts were always fascinating to me – the celebration with the palms, then the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday, the solemn Good Friday service and the good news of the resurrection on Easter. As I grew up in my home church in Arizona, there were certain *rituals* that became beloved parts of these services. I loved the palm crosses. I always got chills when our pastor would sing "Were You There" a capella from the narthex and I even enjoyed staying up all night on Saturday so I could wear the dress I had just finished making to the community sunrise service at 6:00am on Easter followed by hot cross buns at church.

A number of years ago, the Lutheran church started calling the Sunday before Easter *Palm/Passion Sunday*. The service begins with the triumphant entrance of Jesus with palms and then moves into a reflection of the events leading up to and including the crucifixion. The reasoning was that people's lives had become so busy that they no longer attended evening services during the week. Before the church revised the services, people would leave on Palm Sunday singing about Jesus being acclaimed with palms and show up the next Sunday to sing about him overcoming death. In the words of TV infomercials, "But wait...there's more!"

Each of our Holy Week services at Our Savior's causes us to think about the great sacrifice of Christ and His ultimate victory over death in a different way. I encourage you to worship at every opportunity during Holy Week. Each service is different, but they all point to the same God.

For those that may not know, the High School Youth Ministry of OSLC is attending the ELCA National Youth Gathering this summer which will be held in the fine city of Detroit, Michigan. Why in the world would the ELCA choose Detroit as the destination for 35,000 high school students to gather? Because that is where we are called, that's why. The last two gatherings were held in New Orleans, La. The first in 2009 following on the heels of the devastation caused by Hurricane Katrina, the second in 2012 because the City of New Orleans asked us to please return and continue the good work that was done in 2009. Apparently when you have 35,000 God driven, gospel proclaiming Christian youth working together to serve their neighbor some amazing things happen. The city of Detroit has gotten wind of this and requested us to come and do our thing in their town as well

Besides the opportunity to uplift, connect, and share with youth from all over America we will be doing God's work in standing shoulder to shoulder with one another and with the citizens of Detroit to help with the city's revitalization efforts. Among them is the urban garden project; the city is going to demolish 3300 homes that are flagged as uninhabitable and in their place put in neighborhood gardens, we will be working on this as well as other service projects around the city.

I have been to Detroit recently to see first-hand the areas of the city where we will be working and worshipping and I can tell you that the need is great. But not to worry, Downtown Detroit, where the two main venues for the Gathering are located, is a hub of vibrancy and activity. With new companies headquartered downtown and more than 11,000 new employees working and living in the city, Detroit is home to many young adults at the beginning of their professional careers. With great architecture, cultural opportunities and winning sports teams, Detroit has much to offer.





SAT TESTING

The 1st - 5th grades will be taking the Stanford Achievement Test and the Otis-Lennon School Ability Test beginning April 13th and ending on April 22nd. Students cannot pass or fail a test such as the SAT. Test results will give the teachers an objective picture of how their students are progressing in school. Scores can also show whether a student is improving in certain areas from year to year.

EDUCATIONAL FIELD TRIPS

Our 2nd graders will meet "Big Al" fish at the <u>Dana Point Ocean Institute</u> as he searches for friends. They will interact with interesting ocean creatures while conducting



investigations in underwater adaptations, camouflage and different types of habitats.



The fifth grade class will be participating in the Catalina Marine Institute Marine Biology camp at Cherry Cove, 4/27-4/29. They will enjoy snorkeling,

kayaking, hiking and participating in hands-on science labs utilizing state of the art equipment.

Fourth graders will be going on a two-day, overnight field trip... California Time Capsule. Beginning at the San Juan Capistrano Mission and continuing to the Lazy W Ranch, students will investigate the cultural eras of California history. Students step into the lives of Native American, Spanish, Mexican and Anglo people to learn about daily life, customs and cultural

practices. The activities they will be engaged in include building a Native American shelter; making tortillas and candles; and panning for gold in a mountain stream.



Our 3rd graders will be visiting the <u>San Diego Zoo</u> to prepare for their endangered species project. While visiting they will preview the habitats of many endangered species of animals while observing the animals. The tour guide will discuss conservation issues as well. One of the highlights of the trip is going behind the scenes and meeting several animals, e.g. Bactrian camel and the giraffe.





Meet the Masters Mexican painter, Frida Kahlo, (1907-1954), will show our <u>Kindergarten</u> artists her life through beautiful self-portraits and interesting compositions. She was very devoted to her heritage, and often included a few words within her work to help tell her thoughts in the spirit of Mexican

retablos. The cultural dress, architecture, animals, plants and fruit of Mexico fill her paintings. The children will be using paper and oil pastels to create a still life.

ASSOCIATE IN MINISTRY--Here at Our Savior's?

Did you know that the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America has a special designation for lay people who feel called to ministry in the church; but not as pastors? It's true. There are several designations for this: AIMs (Associate in Ministry), Deacons and Deaconesses. Regardless of the designation, each has been called to devote their lives to the church for public ministry of word and service. They have gone through a formal preparation which has included candidacy formation, theological training, contextual and practical field work. Formal interviews held at the beginning, middle, and end of their preparation before receiving approval for a call. As rostered lay leaders, they are committed and connected to the ministry of their community, congregation, synod and the larger church.

Now, here's something you probably didn't know: Roberta Wall, our principal here at Our Savior's Lutheran School has completed all of her training to serve as an Associate in Ministry and the council has asked that we as a congregation might consider recognizing this training. None of her duties would change, and there would be negligible impact on the budget (all compensation would remain the same); but it would formally recognize her commitment to serve as a ministry professional in the ELCA. Unlike pastors, AIMs are not ordained, but commissioned and serve to connect the ministry of the church with the greater community and the world.

Roberta will be hosting an Adult Forum on this exciting possibility on Sunday, April 19th in the Founders Room at 9:50am. Come and bring your questions.
